FINAL REPORT - VISITING RESEARCH PROGRAM

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My name is Jacopo and I am a PhD candidate in Sociology and Political Studies at the University of Turin (Department of Cultures, Politics and Society), where I work on corruption and illicit networks. I have spent three months in Montreal, completing an extremely interesting and useful Visiting Research Program at the Centre International de Criminologie Comparée (CICC).
