A New Look at the Politics of Policing

Abstract

The presentation will explore the penetration of politics throughout policing against the traditional model of shared governance. Politics is essential in the management of policing:

upward, concerning government;

downward, with respect to internal management;

and sideways, with respect to the public.

The conclusion is that issue of political accountability needs to be rethought.

A specialist in international criminal justice, with particular interest in policing, he has done extensive research in India, Japan, Australia, Canada, Bosnia, Britain, Singapore, and the United States.

He has served as a consultant to the U.S. government and the United Nations on police reform. He was a member of the international Oversight Commission for the reform of the police of Northern Ireland 2000-2007 and is currently a member of the UN's Global Police Policy Community advisory group.
