## Montreal Sabbatical Final Report Saskia Hufnagel

During my visiting fellowship at the CCIC, University of Montreal, starting 23 March 2017, finishing 11 May 2017, a number of projects were started and completed. Attending a number of seminars by colleagues was very inspiring and helpful in the process of researching and writing. The support of the CCIC, both administratively as well as intellectually, was invaluable.

In the first week of the sabbatical an article for a special issue in Global Crime, initiated by the CCIC workshop on Policing Flows, was revised according to the edits received the final version submitted. It was extremely helpful for this, not only to be within a very supportive environment, but also to be close to the editors Karine Cote-Boucher and Anthony Amicelle.

On the 29<sup>th</sup> of March I gave a conference at the CICC on the book project I am currently conducting (Comparative policing study on EU, North America, Greater China and Australasia).
